We used SASNET as a network to identify partners and started to interact with them. As opposed to East and South-East Asia personal contacts was very important in the process.

Delhi University: Easiest partner. Students were just registered through the university's general model for foreign students. Also the cheapest fee.

ISEC: Needed formal request and meetings. Approval of ISEC's board, MOU. Expensive

Peradenyia: Needed meetings and an MOU. But in the end our partner improvised. Did not work well.

In the summer we discovered the dropout problem for the first time.
